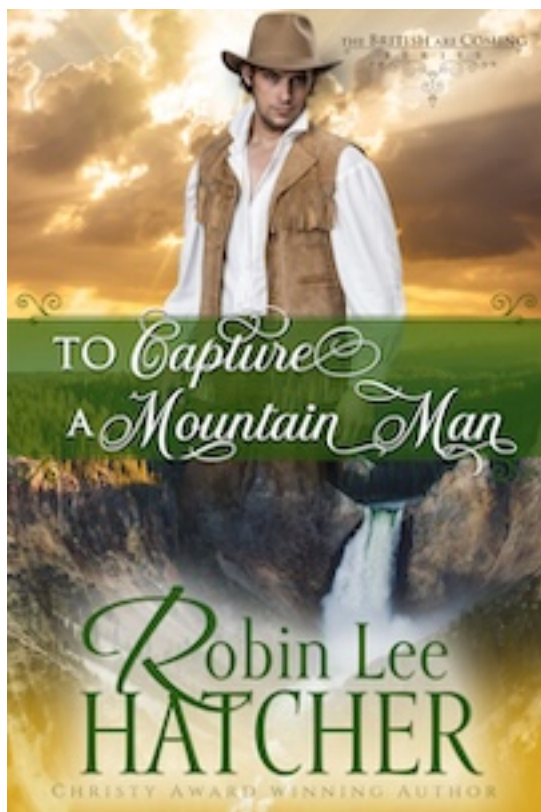




To Capture a Mountain Man:

1. Amanda sets out into Yellowstone looking for adventure and healing. How do her experiences in the wilderness—and particularly her encounter with Isaiah—transform her perspective on life and love?
2. Isaiah is portrayed as a rugged, independent mountain man. What preconceived notions did Amanda (and perhaps you as a reader) initially have about him, and how were these perceptions challenged and changed throughout the story?
3. Amanda struggles deeply with grief after losing her father. How does the wilderness setting and Isaiah's steady presence help her move through this difficult time?
4. Isaiah passionately protects Yellowstone's wildlife from poachers. How did his dedication to conservation resonate with you? What messages about stewardship and respect for nature did the novel convey?
5. Both Amanda and Isaiah exhibit strength in different ways. Discuss how they each display vulnerability and how those moments deepen their emotional connection.
6. Isaiah has chosen a life of relative isolation. How does meeting Amanda awaken in him a sense of belonging or a desire to connect more deeply with others?
7. Amanda and Isaiah come from very different worlds—British aristocracy versus rugged American frontier. How does their love story challenge societal expectations, and how realistically did the novel portray overcoming such divides?
8. Secondary characters such as Roger, William Overstreet, and Mrs. Adler appear in meaningful roles. How do these characters contribute to Amanda and Isaiah's story, and what larger lessons do they offer?
9. Faith subtly guides characters through their trials. In what ways did faith or spiritual growth play a part in Amanda and Isaiah's journey and decision-making?
10. What aspect of Amanda and Isaiah's romance most inspired you? How did their story encourage you to think about courage, second chances, or the willingness to embrace love despite risks?
