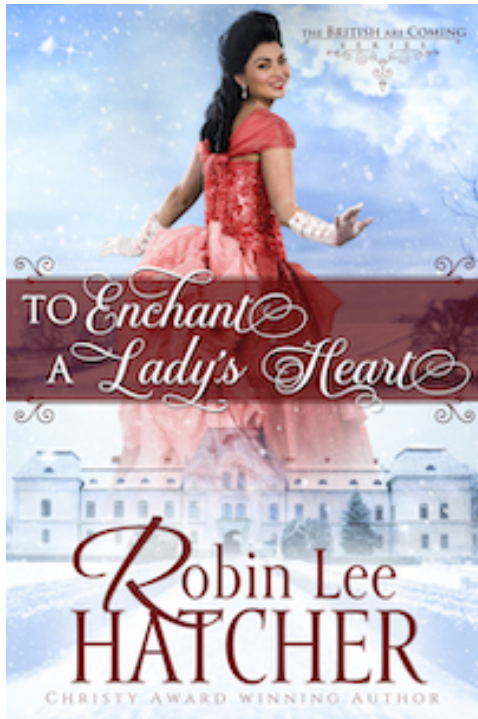




To Enchant a Lady's Heart:
